

Looking back at the comments made in the Presidents page 12 months ago, in comparison, we now have a committed and active committee which has achieved a lot in the last 12 months, the club has a vibrant feel about it with a number of enthusiastic members joining the club, assisting the committee and participating in all club activities.

As I have continually stated in my reports to the General Meetings and in the page in the Fly Line, it would be great if we could get even more members volunteering to help run the club in a small or large way and turbo charge the club activities with much thanks to those who have recently and already offered to help.





VALE Josef Rudolf Jerlitshka.



Everyone knew him simply as Rudi.

Rudi passed away on the 28th of September at the relatively young age of 72, he left behind his loving wife Marlene and his son Michael.

MEMORIES OF RUDI

Josef Rudolf Jerlitschka was born in Markranstaedt, Germony on the 29th of July, 1947 to his parents Thomas and Kathe. These post war German times and his strict father no doubt led to shape Rudi's personality into a hard working, proud and determined young man who never let a challenge get in his way.

As was often the case young Rudi didn't attend University and was enlisted into the Army at the age of 18 where he remained for around 13 years in the medical corp, first starting in Emergency as an assistant. He finished his career at a high rank with the huge responsibility of being in charge of field hospitals.

With the introduction of the intergovernmental military alliance NATO, this led to a great deal of travel and is no doubt where his love of travelling began. Many of you

here will know that **Rudi** delved into travel experiences like many of his other pursuits – with a great deal of passion!

He became an expert on the Scenic luxury cruise and tour group, especially their boats. I'm sure Marlene has a lot to thank for that particular passion ©

Rudi left the army and took a position as an Engineer at Messerschmitt-Bolkow-Blohm an aerospace manufacturer. Most notably it was here that he met the beautiful young personal assistant Marlene and a wonderful friendship grew.

Marlene still remembers the exact date – the 12th of November, 1979 . In 1980 they headed off to Australia to also visit **Rudi's** Uncle Thomas in Sunshine. Three weeks in and they put a deposit on a house in St Albans!! **Rudi** wasn't one to do things by halves and I think this was a pretty brave move since technically they were still of course German citizens!

In mid 1981 they settled in St Albans but the lure of the countryside, specifically The Dandenongs beckoned and they soon moved to the Eastern suburbs where they enjoyed many happy years, especially in Chirnside Park where they were fortunate to live in beautiful surroundings with wonderful neighbours

It seems ridiculous that initially **Rudi's** qualifications were not recognized in Australia but he happily accepted a role at Four 'n Twenty making the most of the situation and continuing his hard working ethic.

Rudi's final career move was to BHP in 1989 and he relished his Managerial role there.

His job at BHP came with great benefits and he and Marlene enjoyed many Grand Prix's, visits to the theatre, good wine and food and the fantastic opportunity of being able to drive all kinds of prestige cars. Much to his mates and neighbours envy!

Unfortunately Rudi fell off a ladder in his late 50's, completely shattering his heel and this ultimately led to his retirement. But he was ready to retire and went on to enjoy many great years with Marlene, travelling, fishing and becoming heavily involved inBonsai.

Rudi and Marlene joined YVFF in 2004 and participated in many fishing and fly fishing adventures. He had a love of fishing western districts lakes spending many holidays there. One of their trips was to Florida chasing bone fish. Rudi served on the committee, he reviewed our contract with the council providing a valuable insight into our legal commitment. He also looked after our advertising for a few years.

Although he loved fishing his other passion was for bonsai and he had very high standards. He was a driving force for establishing the Yarra Valley Bonsai Society and fishing was shelved. He and Marlene have been on the committee since conception, He was president for many years and he and Marlene are honored as life members. At the moment Rudi has a tree on display at the National Aboratorium in Canberra.

Rudi lived a full life and enjoyed many close and meaningful relationships a proud hardworking family man. Always a big greeting and a handshake like a bear a good friend and dearly missed.

Fly Fishing for Saratoga

I've always wanted to catch Saratoga on the fly; I've caught them before on surface lures and thought they would be ideal targets on a fly.

They are a weird, prehistoric looking, living fossil of a fish with big eyes, underslung jaw and no dorsal fin making them well designed for attacking stuff off the water surface and therefore great for catching on a fly.

On a recent trip to Melville Island in the Northern Territory I got my chance to fish for them. The location was Goose Creek, which is said to be the largest freshwater system on Melville Island, over all, it's length is about 60km and it changes from saltwater mangroves in the lower reaches to paper barks and waterlilies in the floodplain areas of the upper reaches. This area teems with birdlife such as magpie geese, brolgas, sea eagles to name a few as well as wildlife in the form of water buffalo and the ever present saltwater crocodiles, the Saratoga seem to like this area as well.

My fly fishing experience with Saratoga is not extensive but I managed to do OK by casting and working a top water fly known as a Gartside Gurgler into the clear water patches between the lily pads and aquatic weeds. It was also good to cast as close as possible to bankside vegetation and any visible snags.

Other different styles of fly patterns such as "Pink Things" or "Clousers" could also be effective provided they are all made weedless.

The Saratoga would attack the stripped fly with a fair amount of "agro" on the surface strike; the strike isn't like the explosive "boof" of a barramundi but it's exciting none the less.

Only problem is Saratoga have a fairly bony mouth structure so setting the hook and getting them to stay hooked can be difficult - I probably lost as many fish as I landed. My partner Merril had many takes on the soft plastic frog lure she was using but none landed, so a fly may be slightly more effective and perhaps striking hard and fast may help, but I need to do more fishing to check that out!

The gear used was a 9wt rod with matching WF floating fly line, which sounds like a bit of overkill for the size of the fish, but I think it was about right given that the fish are strong and feisty and can bury you in the weeds or snags and you never know when a good sized Barra can turn up in the same location.

YVFF Club Trip to Devil Bend Reservoir by George Zanin.

I'm always keen to try out new or different fly fishing spots, so when I heard the club was planning a trip to Devil Bend, I thought, yep, I'll be in that!

I knew that the reservoir was once used to supply water to the Peninsula and was decommissioned and subsequently reopened to the public around 2012, but for whatever reason I never got round to giving it a go, thanks to the prompting of the club trip I'm glad I did.I think the location is a hidden gem with excellent facilities for a pleasant day out.

Access from the eastern suburbs is good using East Link and Peninsula Freeways, the reserve itself has good car parking, extensive walking tracks, toilets, Electric BBQ's, picnic tables, shelters, grassed areas and shady trees. The water supply is a rain water tank with signs saying "Do Not Drink" so I recommend taking your own drinking water and the usual "Take Your Rubbish Home" rules also apply.

Now the fishing......I'll be upfront, no one actually caught anything, but that's often the case until you get to know a new area, I think it definitely has potential worth exploring and I would go back.

The water has been stocked with brown & rainbow trout as well as estuary perch and I believe redfin may also be present. There is a thick band of water weed from the shoreline out to about 10-15 meters which may hinder fishing somewhat, however, I think the difficulty can be overcome by wading out and putting a long cast into the drop-off and deeper water beyond the weed bed. As always take great care when wading in such areas as the footing may not be ideal. I suspect when there are insect hatches happening the fish may well be feeding within the weed bed?

An alternative is to fish one of the two purpose built fishing pontoons which extend beyond the weed. Or if you have them you can use unpowered water craft such as canoes, kayaks or float tubes, just be aware that there is approx. 250m walk from the car park to the nearest launch area so best if your craft is easily portable.

The park is normally open from dawn till dusk, however the park is still accessible to pedestrians 24 hr via a small car park located in front of the main entrance gate, so fishing the "evening rise" is certainly possible.

Thanks to all that attended and Ray Malins for organising trip and BBQ, Merril and I enjoyed the day.

Club Trip Report - Devil Bend Reservoir - 12 October 2019

Not having been to the Devil Bend Reservoir before I was keen to explore when I arrived early. A quick walk down to the launching area and the fishing pontoon gave me a taste of what was required.

On returning to the car to "suit up" George & Merril were chatting with Ian as he unloaded his Hobbie kayak – a great way to fish this reservoir to avoid the weed that lines the shore.

We headed back down the path – Ian had launched his kayak and was on the western side of the reservoir with a north easterly breeze blowing which was strong in the car park but there were sheltered spots at water level.

George & Merril headed passed the Fishing pontoon to the point and I had a few casts while moving towards the pontoon. I turned around to move further down and for the first time in my fishing career two Fishery Officers came down the bank to have a chat – very friendly, told me about the fish in the reservoir and the spots to head for. They asked if I had a licence but didn't want to see my Seniors Card in my pocket inside my waders and moved on.

I continued to the pontoon and had a few casts with a "Woolly Bugger" as I was clear of the weeds but wasn't expecting a fish as the water was super clear and in full sun – it just didn't feel fishy.

I had a look at the "Quarry" next as suggested by the Fishing Officers but it wasn't easy to cast there with a cliff and bushes behind me so I just chatted to a bait fisherman there who was packing up without any luck. The location looked great with plenty of insect life but with perfectly clear / clean water I don't think the fish would come into the shallows until sunset.

I kept walking / exploring – the Point, the Eastern Shoreline and realised the Reservoir was three times the size of what you can see from below the car park with two thirds of it out of bounds to protect the bird and wild life.

I had ran into George & Merril on my wanderings who had seen Awin, his partner Sherin and their three year old daughter – time to head back for the BBQ!!

The park lands at the car park are great with multiple sets of BBQs and picnic tables well set out and clean (but beware of the "Noisy Miners" if you have food out).

Ian had come off the water after being blown about a bit but no fish – yet! And Awin and family joined George, Merril, Ian & I at the BBQ waiting for the sausages to cook – a bit slow!

We all thought it was a lovely place and with good access to us thanks to the freeways but fishing would be better early morning or in the evening (?).

Ian loaded his kayak onto his car with us watching his technique, George, Merril & Awin were heading off home with Ian & I thinking we would "suit up" again and perhaps see what would happen when the sun dropped. We walked back to the "Quarry" and watched the water with plenty of insects on the surface and swallows scooping them up so it was difficult to tell if the rings were rising fish or not.

With daylight saving it was going to be a long wait for dusk so we wondered back towards the cars but watching the water!

It is a place we need to revisit but the strategy next time is to have an afternoon BBQ and fish till dark (gates close at 9 pm) when the fish will be taking the insects off the surface and the weed won't come into play when using Dry Flies.

Fly of the Month



Copper John Nymph

The popularity of John Barr's Copper John is not due simply to its good looks but rather its uncanny ability to catch fish. Like other legendary fly patterns this nymph has a few key features that make it appetising to fish. The large gold bead, slim profile, flash and breathing hackle are just a few of these features; but the real strength for this fly comes from its weight. The compact design and special materials used in construction allow this fly to sink quickly to the level of the fish. The extensive copper body is what adds the significant weight to the fly helping it rapidly descend to where the big fish lay. This unique style of weighting a fly also allows the fly to roll across the river bottom in a natural fashion as compared to a fly weighted down with a split shot attached to the leader.

Materials List

Hook: #TMC 5262 or equivalent

Thread: Black 6/0

Tail: Brown goose biots

Abdomen: Wapsi copper Ultra Wire

Thorax: Peacock herl


Wingcase: Thin Skin, pearl Flashabou, and epoxy Legs: hungarian partridge or hen back or saddle

Bead: Brass

Weight: Lead wire

Library Book Of The Month





The lakes and streams of north-east Victoria provide some of Australia's finest flyfishing for trout. In this book, Philip Weigall sets out to help anglers of all levels get the best from this remarkable area.

Although Philip Weigall has fished the north-east for most of his life, he hasn't forgotten how baffling an unfamiliar fishery can be. With this perspective in mind, the book begins with a description of the area as a whole, including everything from the types of water you're likely to encounter, through to fishing licence requirements and weather. Further in, there are overviews of each of the five major trout fishing catchments, followed by detailed water-by-water descriptions. These descriptions include a reliability rating, and best months to fish. Simple, handy maps back up the text.

For all its valuable how to/where to information, 'Flyfishing North-east Victoria' will also be enjoyed for its striking pictures and design. Philip Weigall is clearly smitten by this beautiful area and his book is as much an effort to capture the essence of north-east Victorian Fly Fishing as it is a guide.

Overall, this is a book that will be essential reading for those entirely new to the area, right through to experienced locals looking for another perspective – or perhaps a new tactic or two to try.
